# Course Description

This course is designed to prepare students for speaking in a university context, using academic presentations, discussions, formal and informal role-plays, interviews, and pronunciation activities. Specifically, students will:

- Manage a conversation using turn-taking, agree/disagree, interrupting, etc
- Discuss a controversial issue
- Give and support an opinion
- Discuss a past event
- Ask for and give clarification
- Participate in group projects and planning
- Discuss problems/solutions
- Lead a discussion
- Can make at least a ten-minute prepared presentation
- Effective use of eye contact, appropriate pace, volume, and use of visual aids during a presentation

### Assignments and Activities

#### **Homework**

- Weekly Blackboard Discussion Each week, you will be required to post an audio/video comment on the discussion board (this will be a response to a listening passage or reading I'll put on each week). You will then need to submit 2 audio responses to some of your classmate's postings. This will be like an audio discussion board. See Blackboard for details.
- **Debate** Please see the attached instructions for this assignment.
- Native Speaker Surveys For each topic, you will design survey/interview questions in class. For homework, you will be required to survey/interview native speakers using the questions/language learned in class. You will then need to either write a summary, record a summary, or prepare a presentation to give in class. (Your instructor will let you know.)

- **Research Projects.** For some of our units, you will need to do more extensive research by interviewing and surveying native speakers, and then preparing a presentation.

- Quizzes These quizzes will be recorded using computer software.
- **Presentations.** You will have 3 major presentations, and several mini-presentations which you will be graded on.

### Assessment and Grading

The goal of assessment is to enhance learning. Therefore, in order for students to be accountable and responsible for their learning, regular quizzes and tests will be part of every class. In addition to regular quizzes, students will take a midterm and a final exam. Furthermore, attendance, general class participation, and performance will be taken into account and will count towards the required criteria for moving to the next level or completing the program.

Students will also receive a mid-term progress report for each class followed by a conference with their teachers to discuss their progress in class and what they need to successfully complete their courses. At the end of the semester, students will receive a final grade for each class they took: "S", *Satisfactory*, indicates they have passed the class; "U", *Unsatisfactory*, indicates they need to take the class again. Important Note: failing a class twice will result in expulsion from the program.

#### Course Policies

#### **Attendance**

Regular attendance is mandatory. In order to learn English, you need to attend all class sessions, arrive on time, and be prepared and attentive (which means No sleeping in class). On the occasion that you are absent, it is your responsibility to make up missed work. Please ask other students for any due homework. **NOTE**: "I was absent" is not an excuse for not doing homework!

Students can be absent up to three times without being penalized. A fourth unexcused absence will result in a mandatory counseling session with the ELP Advisor (Beth or James in CLO 226). An sixth unexcused absence will automatically result in failure of the course and possible expulsion from the program. **NOTE**: Being expelled from ELP means that the student will no longer be part of Purdue University Calumet and will need to leave the United States immediately.

### **Plagiarism**

A student who is found to have plagiarized an assignment or part of it can face any of these consequences:

- Fail the assignment and be issued a warning.
- Fail the course.
- Be reported to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action, usually involving suspension. (In this case, suspension also means being dropped from the program and departing the United States immediately.)

A student who plagiarizes again after having been warned will automatically be referred to the Dean of Students.

### **Disruptive Behavior**

Any behavior that could possibly interfere with learning will not be tolerated. This includes (but is not limited to):

- Cell phone ringing in class
- Private conversations when someone (eg. professor, guest lecturer, or student presenter) is addressing the class
- Conversations in your native language (this is disruptive to the class and considered impolite). See the **ELP English Policy**

Please speak only English in class out of respect for others who are attending Purdue University Calumet to further develop their English language skills. The first violation of the policy will be a verbal warning. Subsequent violations will result in dismissal from

class and unexcused absences, which may lead to failure of a course (see "Attendance Policy").

Disruptive behaviors will result in you being given a "red card." Keep the red card on your desk throughout the class. At the end of class, return the card to the instructor.
